*Expanding in Faith. Growing to Serve.*


**A**t the 2018 Homecoming Banquet, we announced the planning for an upcoming capital campaign: Vision 2020. The goal is to raise \$500,000 in funds outside of general annual giving. These funds will be used in conjunction with up to \$500,000 in borrowed funds and \$200,000 in our capital budget to drive a \$1,200,000 renovation project in Ellis Hall.

The outcome of these renovations achieve four distinct goals: to become a fully accessible school, to exceed fire safety requirements, to create more academic space for a growing student

body, and to refresh an aging building by bringing it into the twenty-first century.

The wonderful news is that through the Alumni Association over two Homecoming Weekends in 2017 and 2018, we have already raised \$50,000 or 10% of our fundraising goal! The next few issues of Laker Connection will feature our progress and more information will be available when we have a “hard launch” of the campaign in February 2019. # STAFF HIGHLIGHT

First of all, I would like to say thank you to the Great Lakes community for all the support I have received since joining the faculty this year. As a first-time teacher, I have felt the full support and encouragement of everyone at Great Lakes, and I can't wait to see where this experience takes me. I not only get to begin establishing my career as a teacher, but I can also follow in the footsteps of my grandmother, Joan Smith, who taught at Great Lakes before I was born. 


